Premier League footballer arrested over rape claim

Dominic Vose, 17, premier League footballer for West Ham, has been arrested on suspicion of raping a 16-year-old girl. He recently won his first professional contract after being signed for West Ham from Fulham.

The alleged victim said she attacked at a property in Herne Hill, south London. He has been interviewed by police in relation to the alleged sex attack at a party. They took a DNA swab and fingerprints.

A spokesman from Scotland said: "Officers are investigating an allegation of rape that occurred at an address in Lambeth on Saturday March 26. The victim is a 16-year-old girl. A 17-year-old male was arrested by appointment on Sunday March 27 in connection with the investigation.

"He was subsequently bailed to return to a south London police station in June pending further inquiries."

Serial rapist who attacked women in early morning hours convicted

Lawrence Dugbazah, 31, from Peckham, south London, was found guilty of sexually assaulting three women in central London over a 10 week period last year.

Prosecutor Tana Adkin told the Old Bailey that the first rape happened after Dugbazah attacked a 19-year-old in Bloomsbury, central London, on 9th of January last year. He threw her on the floor of a cafe doorway in Museum Street. The attack was caught on CCTV.

Adkin said, "While trying to subdue her, he sticks his hand down her throat to stop her screaming. He threatens to kill her." His DNA was matched in March when he was arrested for an unrelated offence. He was later charged with two other sexual assaults because they were "strikingly similar," the prosecutor said.

The second victim was on a 22-year-old woman who was attacked in Lewisham, south London on the 13th of March. However, Dugbazah was disturbed by a passer-by before he could rape her.

Eight days later, he followed, an 18-year-old woman who was in Palace Street, near Buckingham Palace, grabbed her from behind, shoved her into an alcove near a shop doorway and raped her. She managed to get away and ran to a cab further along the road.

Dugbazah is been remanded in custody waiting to be sentenced on the 10th of June.

Man jailed for butting and raping a woman

Karl Oakes, 22, of Hannover Towers, Stockport, who knocked a 20-year-old woman unconscious in Manchester before raping and robbing her, has been jailed.

Oakes followed the woman from a city centre bar last October and pinned her against a wall and tried to kiss her. When she resisted, he head butted her and

repeatedly kicked her as she lay on the ground before raping her. He then stole her phone and purse, kicked her in the stomach and walked away.

Detective Con Kelly said: "Oakes subjected the victim to a prolonged and violent sexual and physical assault, the emotional scars of which will probably never heal. I hope seeing Oakes put behind bars will help the victim in some small way.

"Such offences carry lengthy sentences and we will do everything we can to identify and bring to justice those responsible for such heinous crimes.

"It is only right he has been jailed where he can not pose any threat to women."

Oakes who pleaded guilty to rape, sexual assault and robbery, was jailed for six years by Manchester Crown Court.

Man jailed for the rape and murder of 23-year-old woman

Piotr Moczulski, 26, of Newgale Walk, Warwickshire, was jailed for at least 32 years, for the murder of Elzbieta Kincyzk, 23; also know as Ela, whose body was found in a field in June 2010.

Warwick Crown Court heard that Moczulski lured the victim to a meeting before raping and then clubbing her to death.

Police said she was last seen alive when she went to meet Moczulski on the 6th of June 2010. Detective Chief Inspector James Essex said: "Even when faced with CCTV evidence showing Ela getting into his car and driving off with her in the passenger seat, he continued to deny his involvement in her disappearance and murder."

He welcomed the sentencing of "this cruel, brutal and senseless murder". He added: "Knowing that he is in prison will be a small consolation for Ela's close knit family, which includes her husband and young son, whom she was devoted to."

Sentencing him Mrs Justice Macur, told him he had behaved "most brutally and shown no remorse".

Sexual abuse victims in the Australian military might be paid compensation

Stephen Smith, Australian Defence Minister, said payouts might be paid to victims of bullying and sexual abuse in the military.

The Australian military has been shaken by a series of scandals of sexism, homophobia and bullying in recent months. One such incident involves an 18-year-old female cadet at the defence academy in Canberra.

A consensual sex with a fellow cadet was secretly filmed and broadcasted via webcam to a group of men in another room.

Since then, many former defence employees have come forward with allegations of rape, sexual abuse and bullying during their time in the military.

The Defence Minister said some of the claims against the department date back to the Vietnam War.

He has set up a series of inquiries into the issue.

China's serial rapist prompts discussion on lack of reporting

Dai Qingcheng, 46, a Chinese farmer who is appealing the death sentence after he allegedly raped 116 women has sparked a debate about how women will often not go to police after sexual assaults to preserve traditional notions of "face".

Chen Wei, a lawyer specialising in women's studies, said, any discussion of sex or sexual assault is taboo in deeply conservative rural China, and many victims initially refused to mention the attacks by Qingcheng.

She added, "In the villages, people are very conservative and any conversation about sex is deemed shameful. Even if you are violated, you are ashamed to talk about it."

On one of the online debates on this case, one comment read, “These women are victims of those traditional concepts of ‘dignity’ and ‘face’, and it’s the time to change.”

Many of the victims of Qingcheng were wives of migrant workers and range from young girls to middle aged women.

UK Women's Budget Group and the Fawcett Society

The Impact on Women of the Budget April 2011

A new report published by UK Women's Budget Group and the Fawcett Society confirms the fears of many that the impact of the March budget in the UK risks widening gender inequality.

Key findings of the report show that the current economic strategy looks set to undermine gender equality in the labour market. If current trends continue, more women than men in the UK will be unemployed, for the first time since records began.

The increase in the personal tax allowance threshold will not touch the most vulnerable, and men will gain £140 million more than women.

The businesses set to benefit most from new tax breaks and other incentives are typically owned and invested in by men while schemes to support women in business are scrapped.

Acting Chief Executive of the Fawcett Society, Anna Bird, said, “Women are acting as shock absorbers for the cuts, bearing the brunt of job losses, reduced benefits and the rollback of public services like the NHS.

“If current trends continue, we will see more women unemployed than men. For the first time, after decades of steady progress, we will be turning the clock back on women’s access to the jobs market.”

‘Strengthening Women’s Voices in Government’ – Consultation

On 7 March 2011, the Government published a consultation: ‘Strengthening Women’s Voices in Government’. This sets out the Government’s proposals for a new approach for engaging and listening to women through:

- Direct engagement between ministers, women and organisations that represent women to ensure government understands the views of a wide range of women in the UK, and providing the opportunity for a genuine two way dialogue on policies that affect women.
- Bringing in expertise from the women’s sector and beyond to support the new model and support independence from government where this is critical, particularly in the international arena.
- Looking Ahead to enable [the Government] to anticipate emerging and future issues, such as the impact of the changing demography of the UK, which will be important for women.

- A new IT platform, making the most of modern communication techniques to get the informed voice of women to Government when they need to be heard.

The consultation runs until 10 June 2011 and is an opportunity to influence proposals about Government's new approach for engaging and listening to women in the UK.

CPS launches public consultation

Retracting rape and domestic violence allegations

Individuals who retract truthful allegations of rape or domestic violence out of fear are less likely to be prosecuted under proposed new guidance for prosecutors on the offence of perverting the course of justice, the Director of Public Prosecutions, Keir Starmer QC, said launching the 12-week public consultation.

The guidance will apply in cases where a complainant of rape or domestic violence retracts an allegation and where they could face a charge of perverting the course of justice.

The consultation comes as part of a series of improvements, announced by Mr Starmer in December, to instill greater quality and consistency in the way the Crown Prosecution Service handles rape cases.

The interim guidance details both evidential and public interest considerations for prosecutors.
